
THE REVEREND GLENN MACLEAN


Glenn and Margie have raised 2 families, Shawn, Shannon and Shelagh and later Meghan, Joseph, and Hannah.

Pastoral Ministry has and continues to be our first Love.


















THE REVEREND G. PAUL CUMMING

I entered the ministry at a very unusual and interesting time in history. My first student field in 1957 was in Saskatchewan when the railway trains were often loaded with fresh immigrants from large cities in Europe who were encouraged to settle in the open Canadian prairie and try their hand at tilling the soil (not an easy task) in this vast new land and learn a new language at the same time... and in the open country where they were often hundreds of miles away from communities that weren't even cities. Then there were the War Brides who had been told by their eager beaus that our streets were paved with gold, in order to entice them to ofttimes a barren and depleted land. Children were born to these young women (often girls) and they felt trapped from ever seeing their parents and families again. This demanded a sensitive listening ear of a student minister along with a heart-felt prayer. A student minister was required to grow up fast.







In one Ukrainian rural church I found the women sitting on the left side of the church isle and the men on the right. They were taught to stand in prayer and sit during singing a hymn. One needed to introduce them to our Canadian ways in the most sensitive and timely manner as well as to preach the gospel set forth by Jesus. At funeral services I would have a Ukrainian minister assist me in the service when the older people couldn't speak English and this was often. All this demanded a specific kind of ministry.

In my ordained ministry there were the good times and the difficult ones, and as my minister father once said: "No matter how devoted to ministry you are, and how good a person you are -- there will always be those who don't like you;" (and I will add) and give you problems to deal with.





In my time I served churches within towns and cities in the Maritimes and Ontario. Also, in the 1970's I served in the United Presbyterian Church in Indianapolis Indiana -the Speedway city. In every church the message was "the Christian -God centred one" of Christ's saving grace and of reconciliation and Christian love. I must say that for the most part I have loved being a minister and would do it all over again but allow more time off for myself to recover and heal and more time for my family. Today, I am also ever more open to hear the truths of our Christians who deliver a message somewhat different than my own and also to hear the truths of other religions --and I pray that in the future by the grace of God :we may all be one."



THE REVEREND ALEXANDER (SANDY) MACLEAN

Sandy was born in Fredericton, NB, the son of Rev. Frank and Margaret MacLean. He grew up in Fredericton, Sydney and Charlottetown. He graduated from Dalhousie University and Pine Hill Divinity Hall. He was ordained at Sackville United Church in June of 1963.

In 1962 Sandy married Lila Allen of Wolfville, NS and they have two sons, Stephen and Greg.

The MacLeans had the privilege of serving the following pastoral charges: Redbank, NB, Nashwaaksis, NB, Woodlawn, Dartmouth, NS, Gower Street, St. Johns, NF, Bridgewater, NS, and Central United, Moncton, NB. He also served as retired supply in Trenton, NS, and Bermuda.


Sandy had the privilege of being a Commissioner to General Council in 1966 and 1992 and considers the latter a spiritual highlight of his ministry.


No profile would be complete without mention of his love of and commitment to Berwick Camp Association, having served in various capacities and attending encampment for over sixty years.




As with many others called to this high calling he was never called to be successful but to be faithful.


