It is so exciting to have so many covenanting celebrations happening across the region this fall. Candidate Nathan Zwicker's covenanting on the Vernon Bridge Pastoral Charge was well attended on Oct 29 and another occasion filled with joy. Additional covenanting services are currently being planned across the region. God is definitely at work in FSLDW, and we are grateful for these new ministries and their promise.

On November 1 we welcomed Rev. Lloyd Bruce as our new Regional Minster for FSLDW. We all look forward to working with Lloyd and receiving his counsel in pastoral relations discussions.
