Land Acknowledgement

All of our camps, and all of our ministries, take place on the sacred, ancestral, unceded territory of the MikMaw people. The Treaty of Peace and Friendship was signed in 1726 between the British and the Mikmaw people. This treaty did not implicate or affirm the surrender or transfer of lands and resources from the MikMaw to the British, but set rules for a long-standing relationship between nations, to facilitate trade and prevent war. For the MikMaw, these treaties are revered as legal covenants. Our land acknowledgement is more than words: it is a commitment to upon with meaningful action to live into our treaty responsibilities. May it be so.

Lighting of The Candles (Christ and Affirming)

We gathered as a beloved community, and light candles to remind ourselves of the presence of Holy.

We light our Christ candle to proclaim the life and teachings of Jesus Christ, who was born to a woman in poverty, in a time of social upheaval, and political oppression. Who knew human joy and suffering, and who preached of liberation not domination.

We light our affirming candle to represent our commitment to being an Affirming community. We Affirm the Holy beauty of every person. You are beloved because of who you are, how you identify, and who you love. May this light represent our radical welcome and remind us that the Holy spirit shines through every one of us, in all our diversity.

Let these lights warm us, sustain us, and signify our collective prayers, offered in good faith, entering the light of the Creator. We light these candles to remember, to celebrate, to welcome. Amen.

Exploring the Word Intergenerationally: I spy!

Background

Campers, young leaders, and people of all ages encounter the Divine and the Holy Spirit in creation and the ministry of camps. As part of Camping Sunday, we decorate our sanctuary spaces to remind us of how we experience The Holy at camp in creation.

Set-Up Instructions

Consider placing some camping items and other decorations around the sanctuary: backpacks, sleeping bags, headlamps, paper cut-outs of birds, trees, animals, maybe even a tent or mock-campfire.

Activity

Invite the congregation to notice the items and imagery around the sanctuary. Perhaps ask some wondering conversations with the congregation: · What do you “Spy?” · Does it bring back any memories of a camping ministry experience? · Have you ever had spiritual experience in nature? What was it? · Do you remember learning something new at camp? · Does it make you think of a favourite camp activity?

Wondering

At camp we're invited to arrive as our authentic selves. We leave behind our homework, hometowns and home bases for a little while to explore new relationships and ways of being. We learn how to be humble and helpful; we lift up each other's gifts and live by community rules. The memories of the fun, trust and authentic love stay with us for a lifetime. We delight in remembering them. How can experience of camp transform our relationship with God? How can camping ministry transform everyday congregational life? What are some parts of camping ministry we can bring into everyday ministry?

Prayers of The People

Preparation

Ahead of time, prepare paper hearts to hand out to the community. Heart-shaped post-it notes are perfect for this occasion, and can be purchased at your *local, independent community supply store*, or at Staples or WalMart.

Create a 'community map' either on a cloth, Bristol board or paper locating your community of faith and the camp to which you are connected and celebrating today in worship. Traditionally, congregations within Truro and Halifax presbyteries were connected with Camp Kidston in Middle Musquodoboit, NS. Congregations in the Valley and South Shore presbytery were connected to Sherbrooke Lake Camp. Berwick Camp has relationships with campers across Nova Scotia and all of Canada! United Church camps in Nova Scotia are for all children, youth and young adults, from all parts of our region! Congregations in Cumberland, Eastern Shore, Antigonish and Cape Breton are further afield from

our camps, but our camps are hoping to welcome your children, youth, young adults, and adult volunteers!

This 'map' can be used to receive the heart prayers. Alternatively, you may wish to simply ask people to turn in the direction of a camp to which the congregation has an affinity. For your personal prayer, I invite you to write a word, a name, a place or draw your prayer on the paper heart. This is the prayer that's in your heart

We name out loud or write on the paper heart prayers that we hold in our heart on this day. We join these prayers together with the prayer that Jesus taught us... And at the end of this time of prayer you are invited to paste your prayer on the map.
